The IEBC launched the Post-Election Evaluation report for the August 2017 General election and the 26th Fresh Presidential Election which afforded the EMB and stakeholders in the electoral process an opportunity to examine the experiences of voters, candidates, election officials and Political Parties.

Foreword



I am pleased to present to the Nation the 2018/2019 Annual Report of the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission.

The year under review marked the conclusion of the 2017 electoral cycle where the Commission carried out a number of post-election activities, key among them being post-election evaluation and launch of the resultant report. It is a celebrated adage that an institution that doesn't evaluate its performance loses an opportunity to learn and identify gaps

in its processes. Consequently, the Commission commenced the review of the 2015-2020 Strategic Plan in order to realign its mission, vision, goals and priorities, based on the lessons learnt from the post-election evaluation report. In addition, the Commission successfully conducted nine (9) by elections that were occasioned by various election petitions and death.

Furthermore, the Commission embarked on the prerequisite activities in the pre-election phase including legal reforms. Towards this end, and in a bid to address some of the gaps identified in the legal framework, the Commission drafted and submitted the following bills to Parliament;

- i. Draft Referendum Bill 2019
- ii. Draft proposed Procedures for the delimitation of boundaries
- iii. Amendment Bill to the IEBC Act, 2011.
- iv. Draft Election campaign financing Amendment Bill 2019

Moreover, the Commission commenced preparations for the review of constituencies and wards in cognisance of Article 88 (4)(C) and 89(2) of the Constitution of Kenya that provide for the review of names and boundaries of constituencies at an interval of not less than 8 years and not more than 12 years.

As part of its Corporate Social Responsibility, the Commission conducted 41 elections for schools and Tertiary Institutions. This was meant to nurture and instil the culture of democratic elections in the citizenry right from the tender and youthful stage. In addition, the Commission conducted elections for the Judges and Magistrates representative to the Judicial Service Commission (JSC), the Law Society of Kenya (LSK) Male Representative and the Kenya Red Cross Society.

In the year under review, promoters of Punguza Mizigo Referendum Initiative presented to the Commission a proposed Constitution of Kenya Amendment Bill, 2019. The Commission verified the details of the supporters and confirmed that the initiative was supported by 1,222,541 registered voters before submitting the Bill to the County Assemblies for consideration.

In order to meet the Constitutional requirement as per Article 88 (4)(a) of the Constitution, the Commission commenced Continuous Voter Registration (CVR) in all the 290 Constituencies form August 2018 to date to provide an opportunity to the youths who turn 18 years and acquire their National Identity cards and other eligible citizens to register as voters. Similarly, to meet the provisions of Article 88(4)(g) the Commission conducted an Annual Voter Education Week (AVEW)

in all the 47 Counties and 290 Constituencies to sensitize the public on their rights and responsibilities in the electoral process.

To reposition the Commission for the effective and efficient delivery of electoral services, the Commission enhanced its human resource capacity by filling the vacant positions of the Director Human Resource and Administration and the Director Supply Chain Management. However, recruitment for the other vacant positions has encountered delays occasioned by, *inter alia*, ongoing court litigation.

It is acknowledged the world over that the conduct of elections bears inherent risks. In recognition of this, the Commission developed and implemented a Risk Management Framework and trained its staff on risk management.

In addition, the Commission continued to enhance the use of ICT in its internal business operations and the electoral process. However, it faces various challenges related to ICT. Key among them is inadequate budgetary allocation for maintenance of ICT equipment and software hence making reuse of these election technologies untenable. This in turn increases the cost of elections as the reuse of such technology is not guaranteed.

Similarly, the Commission is also unable to undertake mandatory legal activities such as the Audit of election technologies. Additionally, due to the unique nature of election technologies, the Commission faces challenges in the implementation of the National Treasury Circular No. 8 of 2018 titled "Guidelines for The Preparation of the Medium Term Budget for The Period 2019/20 – 2021/22" requiring that all ICT equipment and services be procured centrally through the Ministry of ICT. Implementation of the said guidelines will greatly undermine the independence of the Commission and credibility of elections.

The IEBC, as an institution committed to continuous learning, interacted with other EMBs and relevant institutions to benchmark on best practices in electoral management. During the year under review, the Commission participated in local and international liaisons, benchmarking visits and Election Observation Missions. The Commission also accredited 608 Election Observers for the nine by-elections conducted in the year under review and seven Observers for the verification of the Punguza Mizigo Referendum Initiative Supporters.

The Commission continues to work with relevant electoral stakeholders to ensure public participation and inspire trust. In this regard, the Commission established partnerships and collaboration with the Council of Governors (CoG), Uraia Trust, Handicap International, Office of Registrar of Political Parties, Catholic Justice and Peace Committee, United Nations Development Programme, UN Women, Kenya School of Government, Ministry of Education, Law Society of Kenya and Maendeleo ya Wanawake that culminated into signing of five Memorandum of Understanding.

The greatest challenge faced by the Commission and election Management in Kenya is the lack of financial autonomy as a result of delay in operationalization of the IEBC Fund as envisaged in Section 18 of the IEBC Act. The Commission has not received sufficient funds to fully fund its Constitutional mandate. This has impeded the implementation of key approved Commission

priorities such as: restructuring of the Commission for improved governance; acquisition of Commission's own building for the headquarters (Uchaguzi Center); conduct of various legally required activities such as Audit of election technology and continuous voter registration; and maintenance of election technology for reuse.

In addition, the Commission urgently requires a sum of Kshs. 4, 330, 423, 876/- to pay audited pending bills, as at 30th June 2019, which pose a serious risk in delivery of its mandate as relates to conduct of Elections and Referenda.

Looking forward, the Commission calls upon Parliament and National Treasury to facilitate the operationalisation of the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission fund to guarantee financial autonomy of the IEBC, In the meantime, the Commission will continue to engage with the National Treasury and development partners to bridge the budgetary gaps in order to sustain the implementation of its Constitutional mandate.

In the same vein, the Commission urges Parliament and National Treasury to timely provide sufficient budgetary allocation to enable the Commission procure goods and services for the 2022 General Elections.

Furthermore, the Commission calls upon the National Assembly to fast-track the enactment of the proposed law amendments and bills in order to afford ample time for preparation of elections.

In conclusion, I wish to recognize and appreciate the support received from various institutions including National and County Governments, Parliament, Political Parties, Civil Society Organizations, Development Partners and the Public in general.

Finally, I must commend the efforts of the IEBC Secretariat who continue to work tirelessly towards making Kenya a stronger democracy.



The Commission

The Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission is a Constitutional body established under Article 88 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010; and a body corporate pursuant to Article 253 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.

Our Mandate

The Commission is mandated under Article 88(4) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 to conduct or supervise referenda and elections to any elective body or office established by the Constitution, and any other elections as prescribed by an Act of Parliament. The IEBC is specifically responsible for:

- a) The continuous registration of citizens as voters;
- b) The regular revision of the voters' roll;
- c) The delimitation of constituencies and wards;
- d) The regulation of the process by which parties nominate candidates for elections;
- e) The settlement of electoral disputes, including disputes relating to or arising from nominations, but excluding election petitions and disputes subsequent to the declaration of election results;
- f) The registration of candidates for election;
- g) Voter education;
- h) The facilitation of the observation, monitoring and evaluation of elections;
- i) The regulation of the amount of money that may be spent by or on behalf of a candidate or party in respect of any election;
- j) The development and enforcement of a code of conduct for candidates and parties contesting elections; and
- k) The monitoring of compliance with the legislation required by Article 82 (1) (b) of the Constitution relating to nomination of candidates by parties.

The Legal Framework

Other than the Constitution of Kenya, the major legislative provisions under which the IEBC derives its core business processes, purpose, values and leadership capabilities and conducts its activities are as shown in Table 1.

Service Charter


The Commission's Service Charter provides the public with an explanation of IEBC services, how they are provided and the standards of service provided. As a key corporate document the Service Charter also guides IEBC staff in their interactions with the public.

Organization

Following the amendments to the IEBC Act, 2011, the Commission consists of a Chairperson and six members. The Chairperson is appointed by the President, while the Vice-Chairperson who must be of the opposite gender is elected by the Members of the Commission. The Commissioners serve on full time basis for a single term of six years. The principal role of the Commission is to formulate policy and strategy of the Commission and oversight to the Secretariat.

The Commission competitively recruits and appoints the Commission Secretary/CEO as Secretary to the Commission and Head of the Secretariat. The CEO is also the Commission's Accounting Officer appointed by the National Treasury. Assisting the CEO are two Deputy Commission Secretaries; one in charge of Support Services and the other Operations.

The Directors are assisted by Managers and other staff; and are responsible for the design and development of the Commission's programmes. County offices headed by County Elections Managers (CEMs) are responsible for implementation of programmes and activities at the County level while the Constituency Election Coordinators (CECs) are responsible for the Commission's programme and activities at the Constituency level. Figure 1: Organization Structure




Figure 2: IEBC County Administrative Arrangement

Figure 3: Planning, Operating and Reporting Framework





Figure 4: Strategic Pillars

Investigation and Prosecution of Cases in Courts

In the year under review, the Commission monitored and investigated allegations on election malpractices in Nyando, Muhoroni, Lugari, Emuhaya, Vihiga and Embakasi West Constituencies. The Commission collaborated with the office of the Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) to conclude the investigations. DCI is mandated to recommend criminal matters to Office of the Director of Public Prosecution (ODPP) for prosecution. The ODPP is the body charged with prosecutorial powers on electoral matters.

Administration of Oath to Election Officials

Pursuant to the Elections Act, 2011, all officials participating in an election are required to take an oath of secrecy administered by a magistrate or a Commissioner for Oaths. For purposes of the by-elections and the verification of the Punguza Mizigo¹ Referendum initiative, the Commission deployed its inhouse counsel to administer oaths.

Publication of Commission Decisions

The Commission, pursuant to Section 27 (1) of the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission Act, 2011 is required to publish and publicize all important information within its mandate affecting the nation. In the year under review, the Commission publicized information in the Kenya Gazette, print and electronic media. This included publication of dates, Party Primary aspirants, nominated candidates, polling stations, tallying centres, elected persons for By - Elections and also replacement of persons through allocation in the party list as shown in Table 3.

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Allocation of Special Seats

Section 37 of the Elections Act 2011, provides for the management of Party List and Allocation of Special seats to the County Assemblies. Pursuant to this provision, the Commission is mandated to manage Party List allocations during the life of Parliament when vacancies occur as a result of death, resignation, suspension or revocation of a nominated member.

The Punguza Mizigo (Constitution of Kenya Amendment) Bill, 2019

Article 257 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 provides for the amendment of the Constitution through a popular initiative. Once initiated and collection of signatures concluded, the same is submitted to the Commission for verification on whether the initiative is supported by at least one million registered voters.

In the year under review, the promoters of Punguza Mizigo Initiative delivered to the Commission a proposed Constitution of Kenya Amendment Bill, 2019 pursuant to Article 257 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. The Promoters of the initiative also delivered supporting documents containing details of supporters in both print and electronic format.

In compliance with Article 257(4) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, the Commission undertook a verification exercise to confirm whether the Punguza Mizigo initiative was supported by at least one million registered voters. The table 12 illustrates the outcome of the verification exercise.

Electoral Training

Training is an integral part of the Commission election activities which ensures effective and efficient electoral processes. An accurate and credible register of voters is a significant step towards inclusive, free, fair and transparent elections. It ensures that eligible citizens are allowed to vote. The completeness of the register depends on the number of eligible voters contained in the register of voters.

The Commission registered 19,611,423 eligible persons as voters for the 8th August, 2017 General election. The exercise was then suspended as per Section 5(2) of the Elections Act, 2011.

In line with the provision of Article 88(4) (a) (b) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 the Commission commenced Continuous Voter Registration (CVR) on 15th October 2018 in all the 290 Constituencies.

Continuous Voter Registration exercise was to provide an opportunity to the youths who have received National identity card since the March 2017 voter registration exercise and other eligible citizens who had not registered as voters.

In the year under review, the Commission conducted administrative boundaries status assessment to identify the gaps between current establishment in comparison to the 2012 gazzettement and the implications on the forthcoming boundary delimitation as outlined in the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.

Result # 7: IEBC's Business Processes Re-Engineered for Increased Efficiency and Productivity Integration of ICT in the Electoral process

The Commission continues to embrace use of Information Communication Technology (ICT) to enhance efficiency and transparency of the electoral processes. The continued integration of ICT has greatly enhanced the overall credibility of the electoral process.

During the year under review, re-engineering of business processes in the Commission remained a priority focus area to ensure efficiency in the internal operations. The Commission continued to apply ICT solutions to automate its internal processes. In order to ensure availability, reliability and security of ICT systems, the Commission maintained its infrastructure and systems in compliance with the Election laws (Amendment) Act, 2016 and the Election (Technology) Regulations, 2017.

The Commission deployed Kenya Integrated Election Management System (KIEMS) for voter identification, candidate registration and results transmission in the by-elections. The voters were electronically identified using KIEMS at their respective polling stations. Additionally, the candidate registration system was used to register candidates and generate ballot proofs. The Election results forms were published on the online portal for public access.

During the year under review, The National Treasury issued a circular providing guideline that all procurements of ICT goods and services had been consolidated at the Ministry of ICT. There were challenges in the implementation of the circular given the unique nature of election technology.

In February 2019, The National Assembly adopted the Parliamentary Accounts Committee (PAC) report that recommended investigation of the contract between the Commission and M/s IDEMIA in its current name or previous names. Further PAC recommended that the firm should be debarred from conducting business in Kenya for ten (10) years. The impact of this is that the existing support and maintenance contract with the vendor for the Biometric Voter Registration system (BVR) may be rendered null and void.

Post Election Evaluation

Post Election Evaluation is an integral international best practice for Election Management Bodies (EMBs) to assess what worked well and what did not work and draw lessons for improvement of future elections.

During the year under review, the Commission conducted a Post Election Evaluation (PEE) of the 2017 General Election and the Fresh Presidential Election (FPE). The report was launched on 12th February, 2019 and disseminated to stakeholders.

Review of Strategic Plan 2015 – 2020

The review of the strategic plan provides an opportunity for the Commission to realign vision, mission, goals and priorities based on the strategic objectives. The PEE identified valuable lessons and recommendations from the 8th August 2017 General Election and 26th October 2017 Fresh Presidential Election. In order to address the identified gap, the Commission embarked on the review of the Strategic Plan 2015-2020 that will culminate in the development of Strategic Plan 2020 – 2024. The Strategic Plan 2020 – 2024 will provide a roadmap for preparation of the next electoral cycle leading to 2022 General Election.

International Conferences and Election Observations

Local and International Liaison Interactions provide opportunity for the Commission to benchmark on best practices in electoral management. During the year under review, Commissioners participated in 20 local and international conferences, benchmarking visits and Election Observation Missions. Table 18 shows the details of the interactions.

The Commission also received support in from several development partners and CSOs. This included UNDP in support of Media Policy, Uraia Trust in support of AVEW, Catholic Justice and Peace Commission who provided media coverage for AVEW and free conference facilities during stakeholder engagement, IFES who funded the two modules of BRIDGE training.

Supply Chain Management

Acquisition of goods, services and works is a critical component of electoral management. The Commission therefore is required to define its priorities and quantify requirements to inform the timely preparation of procurement plan and its implementation.

During the year under review the Commission maintained and updated the lists of registered contractors and suppliers. Stock-taking of strategic and non-strategic materials was carried out in all Commission's warehouses.

STRATEGIC PILLAR 3: ENHANCING PUBLIC TRUST AND PARTICIPATION

Public trust and participation is a pillar under the IEBC Strategic Plan 2015-2020 that is aimed at instilling confidence and trust in the electoral process among citizens. In cognizance of this, the Commission worked closely with electoral stakeholders. This participation was aimed at ensuring inclusivity in the electoral process.

Voter Education

In the year 2018-2019, the Commission undertook voter education and stakeholder engagements. A sustained effort in promoting open communication and dialogue through mainstream and social media was intensified. Voter education was conducted in the nine by-election areas namely: Migori County Senatorial; Baringo South, Embakasi South, Wajir West and Ugenya Constituencies; North Kadem, Lelan, Central Sakwa and Bobasi Chache County Assembly Wards (CAWs). A total of 160 voter educators were engaged for the by-elections.




Figure 5: By- Elections voter turnout

On average, the voter turnout in the by-elections was 49.3% with the highest voter turnout being realized in Wajir West constituency at 63.93%. Figure 5 shows the voter turnout in the nine by-elections conducted during the year under review.

Voter Education Strategies

The Commission adopted a multi-pronged approach in conducting voter education as well as continuous voter education programmes with requisite enhancement during key electoral processes.

Some of the strategies used to sensitize, mobilize and educate voters included: review, development and dissemination of voter education materials, engaging voter educators at County, Constituency and Ward levels, collaboration with line Ministries and Agencies particularly officers from Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government; engagement of the media, holding of stakeholder forums, opportunistic gatherings and organized events.

The other strategies that the Commission used were; Annual Voter Education Week (AVEW), targeting of school going children through voter education for schools programme, use of influencers and opinion leaders, use of social media (twitter, facebook and Instagram) and the IEBC website and customization of various voter education materials.

In the Counties and Constituencies, the voter education strategies were customized to appeal to voters in the specific areas. Some of these strategies included: road shows, races and use of local bodaboda² riders to hype events.

Annual Voter Education Week (AVEW)

The Commission conducted AVEW from 10th to 16th June 2019 in 47 Counties and 290 Constituencies. The main objective of this initiative was to give a platform for voters, Partners and the general public to interact with the Commission across the Country with a view to having a face to face customer service experience. AVEW provided an opportunity for awareness creation among members of the Public on activities of the Commission across the electoral cycle through voter education.

In addition, the Commission engaged the public through door to door visits and canvassing, visits to Churches, Mosques and Market places; community gatherings, School outreach programs, Constituency-based roadshows/caravans, media engagement and on site service delivery.

Voter Education Regulatory Framework

A total of 23 support materials including brochures, posters, fliers and a booklet on Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) were developed. The materials were used in key electoral activities including; By-elections, Annual Voter Education Week, Continuous Voter Registration (CVR), Agricultural Society of Kenya (ASK) Shows, Voter Education in Schools and Outreach forums.

Staff Capacity Enhancement Through Voter Education

The Commission conducted capacity building of staff in grades 10-4 at the Head Quarters. The main objective of this forum was to empower staff with requisite knowledge and skills across the electoral cycle. The 96 staff trained became voter education ambassadors for the Commission.

The Commission liaises with the Office of Registrar of Political Parties and Political Parties to facilitate regulation of Political Parties on electoral matters. During the year under review, the Commission undertook the following activities:

Political Party Liaison Committee (PPLC)

The PPLC is established as a Platform for dialogue between ORPP and the Commission. During the year under review, the Commission held meetings with Political Party representatives to address targeted concerns and emerging issues.

Quarterly meetings with the National PPLC Steering Committee

Targeted meetings were held to address emerging issues, namely;

- (i) PPLC Meeting-29th January -1st February 2019 in Mombasa to review establishment of County PPLC's.
- (ii) PPLC Meeting held on 13th March 2019 in Nairobi to discuss various PPLC issues.

The Commission also conducted elections for new members of the PPLC National Steering Committee following expiry of the term of the previously led 16-member Committee. This too was preceded by preparatory meetings before the Election Day. The following meetings were held:

- (i) National Steering Committee pre-election meeting held on 8th April, 2019 in Nairobi
- (ii) National PPLC Plenary Meeting -15th April, 2019 in Nairobi
- (iii) PPLC Elections for the National Steering Committee-16th -18th April 2019, Naivasha.

Implementation of Electoral Campaign Financing Framework

The Commission is required to regulate the amount of money spent by Candidates and Political Parties in any election. Given the lifting on the suspension of the laws that govern this mandate, the Commission undertook to review its regulatory frameworks as follows:

- (i) Reviewed the 2016 Draft Election Campaign Financing Regulations.
- (ii) Re-engaged the Parliamentary Committee on delegated Legislation on publication of the Draft Regulations.
- (iii) Developed an internal model on how the Commission should implement prioritized areas of the Act (Establishment of Taskforce).
- (iv) Developed draft measures to enhance compliance by Political Parties.
- (v) Engaged Political Party representatives in policy or leadership position conversant with the financial process within their parties.

Continuous Activities - Liaison with ORPP and Political Parties

In its bid to have continuous engagement with the ORPP and Political Parties, the Commission facilitated legal advisories to Political Parties on emerging electoral issues, had consultations with the ORPP on emerging issues around Political Parties that have an impact on the Commission.

Additionally, the Commission engaged with ORPP on political party particulars as governed by Section 20 of Political Parties Act, 2011. There was recommendation to have continuous updating, change of name of Political parties, change of symbols and Change in leadership. This was to enhance efficiency and compliance by political parties.

It should be noted that the PPLC currently performs its functions through the National PPLC which comprises six sub-committees namely;

- (i) The Finance Committee.
- (ii) The Legal and Dispute Resolution Committee.
- (iii) The Internal & External Affairs Committee.
- (iv) The Civic, Political Education, & Publicity committee.
- (v) The Electoral Process Committee.

(vi) The Audit & Compliance Committee.

Against this backdrop the National PPLC with the support of the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties enables the various Committees to draw work plans as against the Commission's roadmap. The Commission offers technical support to the various committees.

Review of Management of Political Party Primaries

Through the auspices of the ORPP, there is an established taskforce that seeks to review the management of Political Party primaries. This process was undertaken through a series of meetings, deliberations and workshops and included targeted forums aimed at enriching the process;

- i) County forums with candidates and Political Party Members-March 2019
- ii) Parliamentary Caucus Group Engagement-May 2019
- iii) Civil Society Engagement-June 2019
- iv) Political Parties Leaders engagement -June 2019

Commission's engagement with PPLC during By-elections

In the year under review, the Commission conducted nine by-elections and engaged PPLC in the following activities:

- i) Held PPLC meetings and liaised with Political Parties fielding candidates.
- ii) Held consultative meetings through its Political Parties Consultative Forum with participating Political Parties to agree on timelines and respective obligations.
- iii) Received and reviewed party membership lists from Political Parties participating in the byelections.
- iv) Received and published names of the persons contesting in party primaries and the dates of the party primaries.
- v) Submission of election officials' details to Political Parties (Regulations 4, 5, & 6 of the Elections (General) Regulations, 2012, fourteen (14) days prior to their appointment to enable parties make their representations). The Commission shared the details of the poll officials for the various by-elections.

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KEY COMMISSION INFORMATION AND MANAGEMENT

1. Background information

The Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (IEBC) is established by Articles 88 and 248 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010. The Articles set out the mandate of the Commission. The Commission is responsible for conducting and supervising referenda and elections for any elective body or office established by the Constitution and any other elections as prescribed by an Act of Parliament.

2. General Information

The Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission is established under Article 88 of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 and is a legal entity. It is operationalized through IEBC Act 2011.

The IEBC Act provides that the funds of the Commission are held in a fund known as the Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission Fund. The fund has not been operationalized.

The financial year of the Commission is a period of twelve months ending on 30th June each year.

The Commission is mandated to submit its Annual Financial Statements to the Auditor-General and a copy of the statement to the Controller of Budget, the National Treasury and the Commission on Revenue Allocation within the statutory timelines as stipulated in Section 81 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012. The Act requires the financial reports to be submitted by 30th September each year to The National Treasury, Controller of Budget and the Office of the Auditor General.



CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

The Commission is accountable to the public and stakeholders through Parliament for ensuring that it complies with the highest standards of corporate governance and operational ethics. The Commission has embraced corporate governance by promoting the right corporate culture and values.

The Commission exercises reasonable care to ensure that the management of the Commission is carried out in the best interest of the citizens of Kenya. The overall management of the Commission is the responsibility of the Commissioners.

The Commission recognizes the need to conduct its affairs with integrity and in accordance with generally accepted corporate practices and internationally developed principles of corporate governance.

The Commission

The size, composition and appointment of the Commission is prescribed by Article 250 of the Constitution and by the IEBC Act 2011. There were three Commissioners who worked on a full time basis during the year under review. Each member was appointed to serve for a single term of six years.

The Commission is well composed in terms of range and diversity of skills, knowledge, age and experience in various sectors which makes it effective and provides an appropriate skills balance for the oversight of the Commission's mandate.

The Commission Committees and their Responsibilities

The Commission delegates certain functions to committees without abdicating its own responsibilities. The Commission has developed a committee structure that assists in the execution of its duties, powers and authorities. The Committees are appropriately constituted drawing membership from amongst the Commissioners with the appropriate set of skills and experience and directors co-opted from various directorates.

The Commission has in place an independent Audit Committee that is chaired by a non-executive member. It also has two independent audit committee members, from the National Treasury and Ministry of ICT, and one Commissioner.

The Audit, Risk and Compliance Committee oversees the internal audit activity charged with the responsibility of continuous review and providing assurance on effectiveness of the Commission's Governance, Risk and Control.

If a member of the Commission or an employee is directly or indirectly interested in any matter before the Commission and is present at any meeting of the Commission at which the matter is the subject of consideration, he/she shall as soon as practicable disclose the fact and shall not take part in the consideration or discussion of, or vote on, any questions with respect to the matter or be counted in the quorum of the meeting during consideration of the matter.

A member or employee whose personal interest conflicts with their official duties shall in writing, declare as soon as practicable the personal interests to their supervisor or other appropriate person or body and comply with any directives given to avoid the conflict and refrain from participating in any deliberations with respect to the matter.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Operational and Financial Performance

During the period under review, the Commission successfully conducted; Migori senatorial by-election, three (4) parliamentary by-elections i.e Embakasi South, Ugenya, Baringo South Constituency, Wajir West and three (3) County of Assembly Ward by elections i.e Lelan Ward, North Kadem Ward, Sakwa Central Ward and Bobasi Chache Ward by-elections which realized an average of 49.3% voter turnout and launched the post-election evaluation report.

Post-Election Evaluation is part of the electoral cycle and is in line with the best electoral management practices. Such evaluation is useful in identifying strengths and weaknesses, as well as successes and failures not only in the organization of the elections, but also in the Commission's administrative operations and our linkages with stakeholders.

The results of the evaluation will inform operational and legal electoral reforms and plans for future elections starting the 2022 General Elections. It will also inform the formulation of the Commission's next 5-year Strategic Plan that covers 2018-2022 electoral cycle. The internal PEE activities are being finalized and the Commission is at the stage of engaging external stakeholders.

The Commission undertook the preliminary processes for the Second Review of Boundary Delimitation.

The Commission however faced liquidity and financial constraints which resulted into inability to settle all the 2017 General elections pending bills. As at the end of the year, pending bills amounting Ksh. 4.3billion remained unpaid.

Compliance with Statutory Requirements

The Commission being a creation of the law respects the rule of law. The Commission complied with its tax obligations and all its statutory obligations in the implementation of its mandate.

Key Projects and Investment

The Commission had planned to construct its own building to house its head office to enhance security and efficiency in its operations. However, the project was not funded during the year under review. The commission will continue to pursue funding to implement the project since the Commission offices are currently located in a rented building which is not conducive for its operations due to congestions, uncontrolled movement in and out of the offices and disruptions to the business enterprises during heightened political activities.

Further, the Commission commenced the procurement of the constructing five (5) county warehouses to standardize and reduce the cost of renting such a critical facility.

Risk Management Activities

The Commission has put in place a risk management framework for risk identification and mitigation. Further, it has embedded risk management in all its planning, execution, evaluation and business continuity arrangements.

Some of the key risks facing the Commission include:

- **Strategic Risks:** These are risks that affect the ability to carry out the long term goals and objectives as articulated in the IEBC Policy.
- **Compliance Risks:** These are risks associated with non-compliance with applicable laws and regulations which could result in litigation and conflicts of interest.
- Political Risks: This is a major risk factor affecting staff performance and safety. These risks could also be attributed to political perception of major political parties on the Commission's role.
- Reputational Risks: The risk of significant negative public opinion and or perception that results in a critical loss of confidence in the institution.
- Financial Risks: The risk of financial loss that may include ineffectiveness of internal controls, financial processes for reporting, budgeting, and fiscal stewardship as well as the monitoring of full financial and performance reporting. These risks may also affect the ability to acquire assets, technology, etc.
- **Technological Risks:** This a possibility of failure of technology employed by the Commission in the conduct of elections and rapid technological change resulting to obsolescence.
- Operational Risks: The risk of direct or indirect loss or inability to provide core services, especially to stakeholders, resulting from inadequate or failed internal processes, resources (including human resources, equipment malfunction), and systems.

Statutory and Financial Obligations

During the year under review, the Commissions' internal audit department validated and verified pending bills amounting to Kshs 3.7 billion as per the guidelines from the National Treasury. The pending bills arose from election operations and petitions in the 2017/2018 financial year. However, the Commission received Kshs. 500m from the National Treasury which was used to defray part of the pending bills. By the close of the financial year, the outstanding pending bills amounted to Kshs. 4.3billion.

Financial Probity and Governance

The Commission incurred actual expenditure amounting to Kshs 4.6 Billion as at the end of the of 2018/2019 financial year.

To obtain assurance on compliance and prudence in the management of the election finances, the Commission has collaborated with the relevant statutory oversight bodies and continues to undertake internal financial reviews whose outcome enables the Commission to strengthen its operational and financial systems.

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (CSR)

The theme of the Commission CSR policy, "connecting with the voter" guides its CSR initiatives. The initiatives are geared towards promoting positive attitude, Social and perceptional change towards the Commission in order to realize its constitutional mandate.

During the period under review, the Commission undertook continuous voter and civic education, visited prisons and undertook planning in various counties and constituencies.

The Commission has continued to organize and support the conduct of school student council elections in primary, secondary and tertiary institutions as a way of giving back to society as well as nurturing the young minds to uphold democratic tenets at young levels and embrace the democratically elected leadership.

REPORT OF THE CEO/COMMISSION SECRETARY

The Public Finance Management Act, 2012, requires the Accounting Officer to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Commission as at the end of each financial year and of its operating results. It also requires the Accounting Officer to ensure that the Commission maintains proper accounting records that disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the Commission. The Accounting Officer is also responsible for safeguarding the Commission's assets.

The Accounting Officer is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) and in a form that complies with the standards prescribed by the Public Sector Accounting Standards Board (PSASB). This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, safeguarding the assets, selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies, and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

The Accounting Officer accepts responsibility for the annual financial statements, which have been prepared using appropriate accounting policies supported by reasonable and prudent judgments and estimates, in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS), and in the manner required by the PFM Act, 2012. The Accounting Officer is of the opinion that the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of financial affairs of the Commission and of its financial position. The Accounting Officer further accept responsibility for the maintenance of accounting records that may be relied upon in the preparation of financial statements, as well as adequate systems of internal financial control.

Nothing has come to the attention of the Accounting Officer to indicate that the Commission will not remain a going concern for at least the next twelve months from the date of this statement.

It gives me great pleasure to present the Commission's annual financial statements for the year ended 30th June 2019.

During the period under review, National Treasury allocated to the Commission Kshs. 4.9 billion under the recurrent vote while the Commission incurred total expenditure of Kshs. 4.6 billion. In addition, the Commission collected Kshs. 1.6 million in form of Appropriation in Aid (AIA). These funds were applied to fund various operational activities of the Commission.

It is noteworthy that the Commission, inter alia, successfully conducted nine (9) by-elections, launched the Post-Election Evaluation Report, carried out the Annual Voter Education Week (AVEW) exercise, developed guidelines to superintend various proposed Referendum Initiatives, reviewed electoral laws reforms through developing proposed amendments to be enacted by the National Assembly and reviewed the Commissions policies and procedures relating to Human Resource, Risk, Finance, Procurement and ICT.

The abovementioned successes do not diminish the need for sufficient monetary allocation by Treasury to fund the core mandate of the Commission and settle pending bills which continue to attract interest for non-payment.

In Conclusion, I applaud the Members and Staff of the IEBC as well as all partners and stakeholders for their support towards fulfilling Commission's mandate as enshrined in the Constitution of Kenya 2010.

For the Year Ended 30th June 2019

1. Statement of compliance and basis of preparation – IPSAS 1

The Commission's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with the International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The financial statements are presented in Kenya shillings, which is the functional and reporting currency of the Commission and all values are rounded to the nearest thousand (Kshs 000) which may in some cases make the added decimal balances to vary. The accounting policies have been consistently applied in all the years presented.

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost, unless where stated otherwise. The cash flow statement is prepared using the indirect method. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

a) Revenue Recognition - Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions (Fees, Charges and Fines) – IPSAS 23

The Commission recognizes revenues from nomination fees and fines when the event occurs and the asset recognition criteria are met. To the extent that there is a related condition attached that would give rise to a liability to repay the amount, deferred income is recognized instead of revenue. Other non-exchange revenues are recognized when it is probable that future economic benefits or service potential associated with the asset will flow to the Commission and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably.

Transfers from Other Government Entities

Revenues from non-exchange transactions with other government entities are measured at fair value and recognized on obtaining control of the asset (cash, goods, services and property) if the transfer is free from conditions and it is probable that the economic benefits or service potential related to the asset will flow to the Commission and can be measured reliably.

Interest Income

Interest income is accrued using the effective yield method. The effective yield discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount. The method applies this yield to the principal outstanding to determine interest income each period.

b) Budget Information – IPSAS 24

The annual budget is prepared and presented in a single statement to determine the needs of the Commission. The Commission has adopted the standard which requires budget information to be presented in the financial statements.

c) Taxes - IAS 12

Income tax

Income tax assets and liabilities for the current period are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the tax authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date in the area where the Commission operates and generates taxable income.

Current income tax relating to items recognized directly in net assets is recognized in net assets and not in the statement of Financial Performance. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

d) Property, Plant and Equipment – IPSAS 17

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced at intervals, the Commission recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly.

Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized in surplus or deficit as incurred. Where an asset is acquired in a non-exchange transaction for nil or nominal consideration the asset is initially measured at its fair value.

The depreciation rates are 30% for Computers, 25% for motor vehicles, 12.5% for office equipment and 12.5% for furniture and fittings on reducing balance basis.

e) Intangible Assets - IPSAS 31

Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognized at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange.

Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses.

Internally generated intangible assets, excluding capitalized development costs, are not capitalized and expenditure is reflected in surplus or deficit in the period in which the expenditure is incurred.

The useful life of the intangible assets is assessed as either finite or indefinite.

The amortization rate for intangible assets of the Commission is 30% on reducing balance basis.

f) Research and Development costs

The Commission expenses research costs as incurred. Development costs on an individual project are recognized as intangible assets when the Commission can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the asset so that the asset will be available for use or sale
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits or service potential
- The availability of resources to complete the asset
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development

Following initial recognition of an asset, the asset is carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. Amortization of the asset begins when development is complete and the asset is available for use. It is amortized over the period of expected future benefit. During the period of development, the asset is tested for impairment annually with any impairment losses recognized immediately in surplus or deficit.

g) Provisions – IPSAS 19

Provisions are recognized when the Commission has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Where the Commission expects some or all of a provision to be reimbursed, for example, under an insurance contract, the reimbursement is recognized as a separate asset only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.

The expense relating to any provision is presented in the statement of financial performance net of any reimbursement.

Contingent Liabilities

The Commission does not recognize a contingent liability, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

Contingent Assets

The Commission does not recognize a contingent asset, but discloses details of a possible asset whose existence is contingent on the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the Commission in the notes to the financial statements. Contingent assets are assessed continually to ensure that developments

are appropriately reflected in the financial statements. If it has become virtually certain that an inflow of economic benefits or service potential

will arise and the asset's value can be measured reliably, the asset and the related revenue are recognized in the financial statements of the period in which the change occurs.

h) Nature and Purpose of Reserves

The Commission creates and maintains reserves in terms of specific requirements. Commission to state the reserves maintained and appropriate policies adopted.

i) Changes in Accounting Policies and Estimates – IPSAS 3

The Commission recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively. The effects of changes in accounting policy are applied prospectively if retrospective application is impractical.

j) Employee Benefits – IPSAS 25

Retirement Benefit plans

The Commission provides retirement benefits for its full-time employees. It operates a defined contribution plan which is a post-employment benefit plan under which the Commission pays fixed contributions into a separate Commission (fund), and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employee benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. The contributions to fund obligations for the payment of retirement benefits are charged against income in the year in which they become payable. The Scheme is administered by ICEA Lions Asset Management Ltd.

k) Foreign Currency Transactions – IPSAS 4

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially accounted for at the ruling rate of exchange on the date of the transaction. Trade creditors or debtors denominated in foreign currency are reported at the statement of financial position reporting date by applying the exchange rate on that date. Exchange differences arising from the settlement of creditors, or from the reporting of creditors at rates different from those at which they were initially recorded during the period, are recognized as income or expenses in the period in which they arise.

I) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash at bank, short-term deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Bank account balances include amounts held at the Central Bank of Kenya and at various commercial banks at the end of the financial year.

m)Comparative Figures

Comparative figures for the year have been provided.

n) Significant Judgments and Sources of Estimation Uncertainty – IPSAS 1

The preparation of the Commission's financial statements in conformity with IPSAS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in future periods.

Estimates and Assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Commission based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. However, existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Commission. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur. (IPSAS 1.140)

Useful Lives and Residual Values

The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to inform potential future use and value from disposal:

- The condition of the asset based on the assessment of experts employed by the Commission
- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed
- Availability of funding to replace the asset
- Changes in the market in relation to the asset

o) Subsequent Events – IPSAS 14

There were non-adjusting events, matters or circumstances that arose subsequent to the end of the financial year that may not materially affect the financial statements.

The Commission's Mortgage and Car Loan revolving is managed by Housing Finance Corporation of Kenya and was set up in the 2016/2017 financial year. 21. Subsequent Events

The Commission is not aware of any matter or circumstances arising after the end of the financial year, not otherwise dealt with in the financial statements, which would significantly affect the financial position and the results of its operations as laid out in these financial statements.

22. Budget Information & Other Disclosures

The original budget for FY 2018-2019 was approved by the National Assembly on June 2018. Subsequent revisions or additional appropriations were made to the approved budget in accordance with specific approvals from the appropriate authorities. The additional appropriations are added to the original budget by the entity upon receiving the respective approvals in order to conclude the final budget. Accordingly, the entity recorded additional appropriations of Kshs.506 million on the 2018-2019 budget to cater for pending bills.

The Commission's budget execution statement is prepared on a cash basis and is informed by the actual income and expenditure as reflected in the IFMIS system. The financial statements are prepared on accrual basis using a classification based on the nature of expenses in the statement of financial performance, whereas the budget is prepared on a cash basis. The amounts in the financial statements were recast from the cash basis to the accrual basis. In addition to the Basis difference, adjustments to amounts in the financial statements are also made for differences in the formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of the financial statements and the approved budget.

For the Year Ended 30th June 2019

During the year under review, the Commission was allocated a total budget of Kshs 4.9 billion to fund the management of electoral processes and delimitation of electoral boundaries in the 2018/2019 financial year.

AIA collection stood at 32% and is mainly attributed to nomination fees and fines paid by election candidates in the by-elections. The amounts received depends on the number of by-elections held.

Social benefits expenditure is stood at 36%. Some of the contractual staff contracts were expected to expire after the end of the financial year. Some officers were also given contraction extension.

Acquisition of Fixed Assets was at 26%. This was due to procurement planning and execution challenges.

Routine Maintenance under delimitation of electoral boundaries was low at 28%. The boundary delimitation funds were also reallocated to cater for the by-elections since the Governments budget was prepared on a tight Fiscal policy.

23. Contingent Assets & Liabilities

IPSAS 19 prescribes the accounting treatment for provisions, contingent liabilities and contingent assets and defines their identification and recognition. During the prior year, the Commission was awarded costs amounting to Kshs.59, 854, 000.00 (taxed costs) and Kshs.205, 060,000.00 (capped costs). However, collection of capped costs will require taxation before determination of actual amount collectable. Further, some petitions were filed by indigent litigants acting as surrogates for politicians out to cushion themselves against award of costs. This makes the awards qualify as contingent assets.

In 5th April, 2019, a civil suit No. 352 of 2014 between Royal Media Services Ltd vs IEBC and three others on non-payment of a bill amounting Kshs. 182,000,000.00 was dismissed with costs at Milimani Commercial & Tax Division High Court.

The Commission recognizes a possible future obligation of Kshs. 157,351,000.00 to pay 2013 General Election pending bills which have not been validated by the National Treasury's internal audit department or have pending court cases. The Commission also recognizes possible future obligations relating to legal fees on pending court cases and gratuities payable to staff members who are on a term contract.

For the Year Ended 30th June 2019

24. Employee Benefits: Defined Contribution Scheme

IPSAS 25 prescribes the accounting and disclosure requirements for employee benefits and establishes the matching principle that the cost of the employee benefits should be recognized in the period in which the employee provides the services to the entity and not when they are paid or become payable. The Commission runs a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held in a separate trustee administered fund, which is funded by contributions from both the Commission as the employer at 15% and employees at 7.5% of basic salary. The scheme is currently managed by ICEA Lion Asset Management.

The Commission's contributions to the above scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account in the period to which they relate. The last audited fund financial position was as reflected below:

26. Entity Tax Status

The Commission is a government agency, fully funded by the government and is therefore tax exempt. The Commission pays taxes as per the regulations.


