



RESPONSE TO CONCERNS BY AZIMIO LA UMOJA ONE KENYA COALITION PARTY REGARDING THE GENERAL ELECTION

1. Electronic Transmission of Results

ISSUE

- Has the commission developed constitutionally compliant protocols for the results transmission path from the polling station to the National tallying centre?
- When will the commission share the said protocols with stakeholders?
- What measures has the commission put in place to ensure that the provisions of Section 39(1C) of the Elections Act, regarding electronic transmission of results and the publishing of polling result forms on an online public portal, are complied with?

RESPONSE

Section 39(1C) of the Elections Act provides:

For purposes of a presidential election the Commission shall-

- (a) electronically transmit, in the prescribed form, the tabulated results of the election of the President from a polling station to the constituency tallying centre and to the national tallying centre;*
- (b) tally and verify results received at the national tallying centre; and*
- (c) publish the polling results forms on an online portal maintained by the Commission.*

Pursuant to Section 39(1C) and Regulation 82(1) of the Elections (General) Regulations the Commission has developed a Results Management Framework that provides, among others, the results transmission path for election results from the polling station to the constituency and national tallying centres. The presiding officer, after announcing the presidential results at the polling station, shall electronically transmit to the constituency tallying centre, and the national tallying centre the duly filled prescribed form of election results (form 34A) via a secure network. The image

of the forms will then be shared with the public and stakeholders via Public Web Portal and Application Programming Interface (API) respectively.

2. The Register of Voters

ISSUE

- **What is the status of the supply, delivery, installation, upgrade, testing and simulation of servers of the Biometric Voter**

RESPONSE

The Commission enrolled voters using biometric voter registration system that ended on 4th of May 2022 and is in the final stages of compiling the register of voters using the existing infrastructure.

ISSUE

- **Stakeholders are given to understand that the commission does not intend to have hard copies of the voters register at the polling stations. What administrative arrangements has the commission put in place to ensure that all eligible citizens exercise their constitutional the right to vote in the event of technology problems and that ineligible individuals do not vote?**

RESPONSE

The Commission made a decision not to use the printed Register of voters based on the findings of the Post-Election Evaluation Report for the 2017 General Election and Fresh Presidential Elections. It was established that the use of the printed Register of voters provided an avenue for misuse during the voting process.

In an attempt to ensure that such misuse does not occur and to enhance the credibility of the voting process, the Commission decided to bar the use of printed register to ensure that all voters are strictly identified electronically using their captured biometric data and to eliminate the possibility of identification of voters using the printed register.

Each KIEMS kit will be loaded with a digital Register of Voters and a QR code will be used to access the voters for the respective polling station for purposes of electronic voter identification. Where voters cannot be identified electronically using their biometric then their biographical information (alphanumeric data) as indicated in their identification documents will be used to ascertaining their identity and clear them.

The KIEMS kits have been enabled to work in an offline and standalone mode during identification at the polling station. In addition, Commission will deploy back-up kits in each ward to replace any kit that will malfunction.

3. Integrity of the Register of voters


ISSUE

- **What is the status of the voter registration exercise on a county by county and constituency by constituency basis?**

RESPONSE

The Commission commenced continuous voter registration on 13th October 2018 and as at 31st August 2021 a total of 180,938 had been registered as voters. Thereafter, the Commission conducted Enhanced Continuous Voter Registration (ECVR) in two phases as summarized in the annexed Table 1: Summary of Voter Registration

ISSUE

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- **Did the Commission take measures to ensure the register is in compliance with Section 31 of the Data Protection Act, 2019?**

RESPONSE

The Constitution of Kenya under Article 31 provides for the right to privacy as a fundamental right. To give effect to this Constitutional right, Parliament enacted the Data Protection Act, 2019 pursuant to which the Commission has endeavored to put in place the necessary frameworks for compliance not only to the Act but also Section 25(I) and 27(6) of IEBC Act, 2011 on ensuring the management of personal data in accordance with principles of personal data protection. In compliance, the Commission conducted Data Protection Impact Assessment (DPIA) and deposited the same with the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner (ODPC) in-line with Section 31 of the Data Protection Act 2019. Further, third parties like KPMG who have been processing our data carried out their own DPIA, filed the same with the ODPC and copied the Commission in compliance with Act.

ISSUE

- **There are numerous reports around the country by voters who cannot find their data in the register. What is the cause of such a large number of complaints and what is the commission doing to address this concerns well before the election date?**

RESPONSE

The Commission deployed KIEMs kits for purposes of conducting the verification of biometric data of voters in all the County Assembly Wards from the 4th of May to 2nd June 2022. In addition, the Commission provided a short message service (sms) platform and public web portal for voters to verify their registration details in accordance with the law. During the course of the exercise the Commission received different queries relating to particulars of voter registration including change of polling stations and transfers. The Commission is taking corrective action, that include recommendations of KPMG, and will be concluded before the publication of the Register of voters. The cases are not as numerous as alleged.

ISSUE

- **Will the Commission have a compliant voters register by August? Can the commission address concerns regarding the integrity of the voters register in a transparent manner including the following issues;**

RESPONSE

The Commission contracted KPMG on 7th April 2022 to conduct an audit of the Register of Voters, while the continuous voter registration activity was ongoing. The continuous registration of voters ended on 4th May 2022, and thereafter verification of the register commenced for a period of 30 days ending 2nd June 2022. The KPMG audit commenced with understanding of the processes and internal controls around registration and preparation of the register while awaiting completion of the Register of Voters.

The Commission received a preliminary audit report with useful information, including 246,465 deceased voters, 481,711 duplicate records and 226,143 voters

registered with IDs that don't validly belong to them, 164,269 registered with voter records with invalid identification documents (IDs and Passports) that have to be addressed prior to certification and publishing of the register.

The Commission will address the recommendations of the audit findings on the Register, prior to certification and publication on or before 20th June 2022.

ISSUE

- **Can the commission make public the results of its investigations regarding the irregular transfer of voters?**
- **How many voters were affected by the said unlawful transfers?**
- **Which polling centers are affected by the said irregular transfers?**
- **Has the commission established when the said transfers were made and who was responsible for the irregularity?**

RESPONSE

my/ During the verification of biometric data of voters, there were few cases where voters' registration details were not in the register of electoral areas they had applied for registration. The Commission has not only taken corrective measures to address the few reported cases but is also conducting a review of all recent transfers with a view of identifying and reversing all cases that could have been effected without the requisite documentations. The conclusion of this process will enhance the credibility of the Register of voters.

ISSUE

- **Has the issue of dead voters in the register been resolved? What is the number of dead voters on the register and how does the commission intend to transparently resolve the issue well before the general election date?**

RESPONSE

The Commission in its inter-agency collaboration with Civil Registry services receives periodic data on deceased persons and upon verification, deactivation of the deceased

voters' particulars is effected. In addition, the Commission received a preliminary audit report that includes a finding of 246,465 deceased voters. The Commission commenced deactivation of details of the deceased voters before certification and publication of the Register of voters.

ISSUE

- **There have been reports that the number of voters in some counties has suspiciously grown by up to one million voters without rational explanation or correlation to population data. Can the commission provide assurance that it will thoroughly and transparently investigate the said reports and take corrective measures if the said reports are confirmed?**

RESPONSE

ny/ch The Commission is neither aware of an increase of voters in any county by a million nor received any report to that effect, save for this memorandum. The Commission categorically states that it commenced continuous voter registration (CVR) 13th October 2018 and by 31st August 2021 only 180,938 voters had been enrolled. In the subsequent enhanced continuous voter registration (ECVR) exercise that was conducted in two phases, a total of 2,550,939 new voters were registered. The Commission is not aware of any other figures and welcomes any report that will aid identifying any suspicious increase in voter registration.

4. Audit of the Register of Voters

ISSUE

- **Is the Preliminary report by the audit firm ready? If so, what are the preliminary findings?**
- **When is the draft final Report of audit of register of voters expected?**

RESPONSE

The Commission received a preliminary audit report with useful information, including 246,465 deceased voters, 481,711 duplicate records and 226,143 voters

registered with IDs that don't validly belong to them, 164,269 registered with voter records with invalid identification documents (IDs and Passports) that have to be addressed prior to certification and publishing of the register.

The Commission is scheduled to receive the final audit report on 16th June 2022 and thereafter engage stakeholders on the final register of voters on 17th June 2022.

5. Proposal to amend the Elections (General) Regulations

ISSUE

The Commission has made several proposals, presently before the delegated legislation committee of Parliament, to amend the subsidiary regulations in the Elections Act that on the face of it seem to undermine the constitutional requirement for transparent and credible management of the results transmission protocols. Such amendments include:

- **A proposal to amend regulation 82 (2) of the Elections (General) Regulations to read that if transmission fails at a polling station the presiding officer will move to the nearest polling station that has a good network and transmit the result and if there is still no network, the presiding officer will proceed to the constituency tallying centre and transmit the results from there.**

RESPONSE

Electronic transmission of election results outside designated polling stations not covered by 3G network was an issue raised in the first Supreme Court Presidential Election Petition of 2017. It is on that basis that the Commission proposed amendments to the Elections (General) Regulations that were presented to the Committee of the National Assembly on Delegated Legislation. However, the Committee rejected this proposal. The Commission will thus deploy satellite modems for purposes of electronic results transmission in areas without 3G network depending on availability of budget.

ISSUE

- **Has the commission mapped the number of polling stations where network might be insufficient to transmit data?**

RESPONSE

The Commission engaged the Communication Authority of Kenya (CA) to undertake quality of service (QoS) of the GSM network in the country for purposes of identifying polling centres that may not be covered by 3G/4G network. The CA has since availed a report, based on desktop review instead of QoS, to the Commission to the effect that 1,111 polling centres do not have 3G/4G network. The Commission will publish all polling stations without 3G/4G network on finalization of the register of voters.

ISSUE

- **Is the commission collaborating with mobile network operators to remedy the issue?**

RESPONSE

The Commission is engaging the mobile network operators (MNOs) to establish which MNO has strong 3G/4G signals for purposes of determining which service provider will provide primary and secondary sim cards for transmission of results. However, the responsibility of providing information on 3G/4G network coverage remains with the Communication Authority of Kenya.

ISSUE

- **Are there alternative solutions to the problem including the use of satellite phones procured by the commission in the past?**

RESPONSE

The Commission, depending on the availability of budget and extent of inadequate network coverage, will deploy satellite modems to mitigate against this challenge.

ISSUE


- **A proposal to amend Regulation 83A of the Elections (General) Regulations to give a Presiding Officer power to open a ballot box that has been sealed to remove wrongly put materials at the constituency tallying Centre.**

RESPONSE

The proposed amendment was informed by a few incidences observed in previous elections where a presiding officer inadvertently locks election results and KIEMS kit or secure election material in the ballot box where chaos erupt in a polling station. The proposed amendment is not novel since in 2017 (owing to lacuna in the law) the Commission gazetted procedures for opening of a ballot box at the constituency tallying centre to retrieve materials wrongly locked in the ballot box vide Gazette Notice no. 9978 carried in vol. CXIX-No. 150 published on 12th October 2017.

6. Recruitment of Returning Officers

ISSUE

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- **The Commission has submitted a proposal to amend the Elections (General) Regulations to give itself exclusive mandate to appoint election officials including constituency returning officers, county returning officers, presiding officers and their deputies without sharing their details with political parties and independent candidates as presently required by Regulations 3, 4 and 5 of the Elections (General) Regulations, 2012.**
 - **The current regulations are in tandem with the transparency and public participation requirements of Article 10 of the Constitution of Kenya and the attempt to remove this transparency mechanism should be abandoned.**

RESPONSE

The proposed amendments do not seek to do away with the requirement of inviting political parties and candidates make representations on appointment of poll officials. The Commission as required by Regulations 3, 4 and 5 of the Elections (General)

Regulations, 2012 informs political parties and independent candidates by sharing a list of the proposed officials to enable those with representations to do so.

Prior to the promulgation of the Constitution of Kenya 2010, the then electoral management body used to recruit temporary poll officials as returning officers. However, since the establishment of IEBC, the Commission has transparently and competitively recruited 47 County Elections Managers (CEMs) and 290 Senior Elections Officers on permanent and pensionable basis who serve as County Returning Officers and Constituency Returning Officers respectively.

It is therefore the view of the Commission that sharing names of returning officers with political parties and candidates is unnecessary since they are already employees of the Commission.

7. Printing of ballot papers

ISSUE

my/che **The Contract was awarded to a Greek company, Inform Lykos (Hellas) S.A. The said company has been linked to last-minute postponement of elections in Nigeria in February 2019 and reportedly intends to sub-contract printing of ballot papers and other electoral materials to other printers. The company reportedly did the same in the postponed Nigerian elections.**

- **What measures has the commission put in place to ensure there are no lapses, both logistical and security, in the general election?**

RESPONSE

Contrary to the allegation that Inform Lykos (Hellas) S.A occasioned postponement of elections in Nigeria, the Company rescued the situation after the initially contracted company failed to deliver materials as scheduled.

Prior to award of contract to the firm, the Commission conducted due diligence and established that the company has capacity to undertake printing of ballot papers, and that the firm will deliver on its contractual obligations without sub-contracting.

ISSUE

- **What steps is the commission taking to involve stakeholders in securing the integrity of the supply and delivery of ballot papers, register of voters, statutory election result declaration forms and election result declaration forms?**

RESPONSE

The Commission will at an opportune time and subject to availability of funds invite stakeholders to check on the integrity of the supply and delivery of ballot papers, register of voters and statutory election result declaration forms.

To ensure that the printing and delivery of the ballot papers is secure, Inform Lykos shall be responsible for printing and delivery of ballot papers to the Commission's warehouse through a system that will track movement of the materials. In addition, the security features on the ballot papers will ensure that only those issued by the Commission are used during the election.

8. Contracting of Smartmatic B.V. Holdings.

ISSUES

- **The contract with Smartmatic indicates that IEBC has outsourced its key electoral roles to the vendor. This includes delegating preparation of the following documents, which should be the sole preserve of the commission, to the supplier:**
 - 1) Biometric Voter Registration Requirement Document**
 - 2) Electronic Voter Registration and Identification Requirement Document**
 - 3) Result Transmission Requirement Document**
 - 4) Biometric Tablet and accessories requirement Document**
 - 5) Project Management plan**
 - 6) IEBC Data Centre Infrastructure Gap Analysis Report**
- **Has the commission given consideration to the compliance implications of such outsourcing?**

RESPONSE

The Commission has not outsourced any of the above mentioned items. The Commission developed technical specifications of the required electoral technology prior to procurement of the same. The requirements informed development of tender documents any successful bidder had to meet as part of the procurement process.

The contract between the Commission and successful bidder (Smartmatic) does not contain any clause that assigns any of the above listed role or function to the firm.

ISSUE

- **What is the status of data migration from the Morpho (Idemia) system to Smartmatic?**
- **Further, has IEBC hired the manpower required to calibrate the 52,000 kits required to manage the election in August?**
- **When does IEBC expect the calibration exercise to be complete?**

RESPONSE

The Commission successfully undertook data migration from Idemia (Morpho) platform to Smartmatic and is currently working on the Register of voters in a new environment.

The Commission has also prepared a purpose built ICT production and processing facility for preparation of the KIEMS kits to be used during the election, and System installation of software is ongoing. As soon as the Register of voters is ready, the Commission shall deploy adequate ICT personnel to complete the process and duplicate the SD cards with register of voters for insertion of the same into the KIEMS kits.

The Commission has put in place technology risk mitigation measures to ensure business continuity such as contingency/backup KIEMS kits, High availability and fail-over mechanisms for the Data Center Infrastructure, Disaster recovery sites.

9. Technology issues

ISSUE

- In late April 2022, IEBC announced that it would add approximately 10000 polling stations to bring the total number of polling stations in the August 2022 election to 52,481.

RESPONSE

The Commission undertook a consultative process with relevant stakeholders in identifying the need for additional registration centres and polling stations and as informed by the population projections. The Commission made estimates and projections on the increase of polling stations based on the target voter registration target of 6 million additional voters.

However, the final number of polling stations will be determined once the Register of voters is ready and bearing in mind that the number of voters in any given polling station is capped at 700 as provided in section 38A of the Elections Act.

ISSUE

- Each polling station must have a BVR tablet which has data exclusive to its polling station and is geo-fenced.

RESPONSE

Each polling station will have a KIEMS kit loaded with digital Register of voters. On the voting day, prior to opening of the polling station, the register shall be locked to the specific polling station via a QR code specific to that polling station.

ISSUE

- Each tablet in turn requires two (2) SIM cards. Hence, 104,962 SIM cards will be required for the 2022 election. Significant manpower is required for the exercise of configuring over 50,000 tablets including inserting over 100,000 SIM cards.

- Further, once the verification and auditing exercise of the Voters register is concluded in early June 2022, the data must be entered into the 50,000 tablets. It took the commission over 10 days to configure the 5000 kits they are using for the ongoing register of voter's verification exercise that commenced in May 2022. At this rate, it would take over 100 days to configure 50,000 kits which must then be distributed to each polling center before the election date. Prior to being distributed, each kit must have its battery fully charged to mitigate against power failure or disruption. What measures has the commission put in place to ensure that the kits are fit for purpose on Election Day?
- Has the commission set up the production site data Centre and disaster recovery site infrastructure?

RESPONSE

m/c The Commission has prepared a production facility and hired staff for purposes of installing application software, the digital register and insertion of SIM cards. The installation of the application software is done wirelessly without human intervention. SD cards populated with the Register of Voters, shall be inserted into the KIEMS kits. Upon completion of the foregoing activities, the kits will be packaged and delivered to the Constituencies in time for the General elections. The Commission will engage temporary ICT clerks to undertake installation of application software, the digital register and insertion of SIM cards as well testing all the kits ahead of distribution.

ISSUE

- When does the commission intend to carry out timely end-to end testing of election technology?

When does the commission intend to issue a public notice specifying the date, time and place of the testing and invite stakeholders to attend the end-to-end testing of election technology?

RESPONSE

The Commission carried out simulation of technology on 9th June 2022 where representatives of political parties, agents of Presidential candidates, observers, media and other stakeholders were present.

The Commission received useful feedback from stakeholders on the simulation exercise.

ISSUE

- **Has the commission conducted the annual audit of the election technology to—**
 - guarantee data integrity;**
 - ensure that the technology functions effectively as specified; and**
 - ensure that the internal controls of the technology are effective.**

RESPONSE

Due to budgetary constraints the Commission was unable to conduct audit of technology in the past but with the current budget the Commission has engaged a firm that is conducting the audit of technology. Recommendations arising from the audit will be addressed by the Commission.

10. Stakeholder Engagement

ISSUE

- **What measures or steps has the commission taken to address the systemic inadequacies identified by the Supreme Court in 2017?**

RESPONSE

The systemic issues referred to by the Supreme court were captured in the Commission's Post Election Evaluation (PEE) Report that informed interventions of the Commission including:

i. Legal Reforms

The Commission reviewed of electoral laws and developed draft amendments to the Elections Act and Regulations. The Commission developed proposals for review of the

said laws and after a series of consultative meetings with JLAC, reduced the same into draft bills presented before the Senate and National Assembly namely:

- a. Draft Referendum Bill, 2020 submitted to the National Assembly and the Senate on 18th May 2020 and 24th June 2021 respectively
- b. Draft Election Campaign Financing (Amendment) Bill, 2020 submitted to the National Assembly and the Senate on 21st August 2020 and 24th June 2021 respectively.
- c. Draft IEBC Amendment Bill 2020 on provisions for Boundary Delimitation submitted to the National Assembly and the Senate on 20th May 2020 and 24th June 2021 respectively.

Further, the Commission made proposals that were submitted to the Justice and Legal Affairs Committee of Parliament (JLAC) and developed into the Elections (Amendment) Bill, (National Assembly Bill No. 3 of 2022): Kenya Gazette Supplement No.12 (National Assembly Bills No.3) to amend the Elections Act, 2011.

 The said Amendments are before the National Assembly.

Moreover, the Commission prepared and submitted a report titled “*Electoral Law Reform in Kenya: The IEBC Experience*” to both houses of Parliament on 19th October 2020. The Report details a comparative analysis of electoral systems similar to Kenya and gives an understanding of the basic threshold that electoral systems must meet. The report further details areas for review of our electoral legal framework and recommends laws that should be enactment to regulate conduct of Elections.

ii. Institutional Reforms

To improve internal processes and procedures the Commission reviewed, and developed where lacking, Policy and procedure manuals for all directorates of the Commission to address systemic challenges identified in the PEE report.

iii. Enhanced Collaboration and engagement with Stakeholders

The Commission continuously engages stakeholders and in its activities throughout the electoral cycle for feedback to improve its processes. The engagement is geared towards improving the election infrastructure and environment.

ISSUE

- **Section 26 of the IEBC Act requires the Commission to observe the principle of public participation and the requirement for consultation with stakeholders. What plan has the commission put in place to ensure stakeholders are fully engaged in all material decisions and processes of the election?**

RESPONSE

The Commission has overtime developed an invaluable network of partners and stakeholders in election management. Some of the engagements included the following:

- i. Dialogues with Political Parties and the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties under the Political Parties Liaison Platform established under Section 38 of the Political Parties Act and paragraph 9 of the Second Schedule to the IEBC Act.
- ii. Engagement meetings civil society organization including faith based organization, Persons Living With Disabilities, Youth organization, Special Interest Groups, development partners.
- iii. Media engagement through the Media Sector Working group
- iv. Relevant Government including Office of the Director of Public Prosecution, Judicial Committee on Elections, National Police Service, Commission of University Education, Communication Authority of Kenya.
- v. Continuous Press Releases.
- vi. Publications in the Kenya Gazette and Newspapers
- vii. Dialogue forums with key stakeholders under an established Collaboration Framework.
- viii. County Forums on the electoral dispensation including electoral law review.

The commission is committed to continuously engage stakeholders in order to address election matters and related emerging issues.

ISSUE

What is the status of compliance with the statutory timelines set out in the revised Elections Operations Plan (EOP) released by the commission on 17th January 2022?

RESPONSE

The Commission is on course in the implementation of the election timelines as provided in the Election Operation Plan as shown in the annexed table 2: Election timelines.
